

Biographies

Barbara Lounder lives and makes art in Punamu'kwati'jk (Dartmouth), Nova Scotia. Her art has been presented in galleries and festivals in Canada, the US, England, Finland, Germany, Bulgaria, Poland and New Zealand and works by her are held in the Canada Council Art Bank, the Arts Nova Scotia Art Bank, the Art Gallery of Nova Scotia, Carleton University Art Gallery, Saint Mary's University Art Gallery, and the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade, Art Acquisition for the Valued Assets Program, Government of Canada. In addition to her studio practice, Lounder publishes and speaks on topics related to contemporary art, walking and other aspects of mobility, social activism and art education.

Amish Morrell is an educator, curator, editor and writer based in Toronto/Tkaronto and Unama'ki/Cape Breton. Along with visual artist Diane Borsato, he leads *Outdoor School*, a platform for outdoor and environmental art practice, and is co-editor of the book *Outdoor School: Contemporary Environmental Art* (Douglas & McIntyre, 2020). He is currently Assistant Professor in the faculty of Graduate Studies at OCAD University in Toronto, where he teaches art writing and curatorial practice.

This exhibition by Barbara Lounder is made up of fragments of history. Among them is a watercolor the artist made of a lichen, from one of the gravestones at St. George's cemetery in Sydney. Thought to be practically immortal, lichen are strange organisms that defy ideas of species individuality, a synergistic composite of a fungus, algae and cyanobacteria that functions more like an ecosystem than an individual.
